Eastern High School lost two of its educational greats over the summer. It is with great sadness that the district acknowledges the passing of Eleanor (Ellie) Doersam and Tyler Blakslee both of whom had an immeasurable impact on the Lansing School District and those families that call Lansing home.

Eleanor Doersam October 3, 1929 - August 22, 2022

Eleanor Doersam had a 39 year association with the district and served as the first female principal in the district at Eastern High School in 1983. A founding member of both the

Eastern High School Athletic Hall of Fame, and the Eastern High Foundation, Doersam's legacy has both depth and breadth. "She encouraged and inspired both with fire and a touch of a feather," said current Eastern Principal Marcelle Carruthers who also remembered that Doersam "had expectations for every Quaker to know that greatness lives in all of them and to walk in that greatness." Her presence in the district will be missed but her legacy will forever live in the generations of Quakers she has touched.

Everett Grad Inducted Into Greater Lansing Sports Hall of Fame

Everett High School graduate and softball allstar, Rachel Turney Justice, was inducted into the Greater Lansing Sports Hall of Fame in recognition for her exemplary pitching career in the early 2000's. She was among seven individuals and three teams, including the 2000 and 2001 Everett girls' basketball teams, to be inducted during the July 2022 ceremony.

"It still hasn't fully processed," said Turney Justice. "It was such an overwhelming night, and it was really amazing to see all my old coaches and teachers."

Turney Justice played basketball and volleyball during high school, but she is most known for her achievements on the softball field. She was an All-State pitcher during her junior and senior years at Everett and still holds Everett's record for wins, strikeouts, and career earned run average. "Rachel was motivated with everything she did," said Ben Billings, teacher and coach at Everett High School. "She had a great attitude, all of her teachers loved her and she was an incredibly hard worker."

Turney Justice continued her softball career during her freshman year at Lansing Community College (LCC) where she rounded out the year with a 35-0 record. The next year she transferred to Michigan State University (MSU) where she had the best team ERA for two seasons and ended her softball career with 296 total strikeouts. She also won the team MVP award and numerous Big Ten Pitcher awards while playing for MSU.

"When I was in high school, I played because it was fun and I had wonderful experiences, but I had a lot of great coaches who gave me confidence that a softball career in college was also possible," said Turney Justice.

Turney Justice graduated from MSU with a degree in chemistry and worked in the pharmaceutical industry. She later went back to her alma mater and earned a master's and doctorate degree in nursing. She currently has an administrative role with Sparrow Health System.

Turney Justice's advice for those who hope to become accomplished athletes is to "do your best, work hard, and be kind to people along the way."

Everett Girls Basketball Teams Recognized

Dwight Rich Student Competes in National NBA Math Hoops Tournament

NBA Math Hoops is a game that integrates math and basketball so students can have fun while practicing fundamental math skills. Nhat Tran, a 5th grade student at Dwight Rich, qualified to play in this summer's NBA Math Hoops National Tournament in Philadelphia.

Students begin the game by drafting a team using real player statistics. They take turns solving math problems to determine which player has the best chance of making a shot. There is also a digital version of the game where students can unlock players as they advance.

"To be selected, a student must show GREAT sportsmanship, play at least 25 games, complete the 10 curriculum pieces and have a teacher recommendation," said Robyn Seelye, Tran's 4th grade teacher who attended the tournament with him and his father.

Tran was also able to explore the city, tour the practice facility of the Philadelphia 76ers and meet the creator of the game, Tim Scheit. At the end of the weekend, students competed for the title of Champion. Congratulations to Nhat Tran for being selected to compete!

READ Grant Hosts Author Visit at Ebersole Center

Over the summer, the READ Grant (Read, Explore, and Discover) hosted Michigan author Kelly J. Baptist for an evening program at the Ebersole Environmental Education Center's "Color Me Wild" Camp. About 50 4-6th grade students participated in the program in Ebersole's brand-new outdoor pavilion. This was one of several READ grant events and book distributions held for summer students in the district.

Baptist told the students that she began writing stories "as soon as she could write" – including persuasive notes to her parents – but was first published in 2015. She won that year's "We Need Diverse Books" short story contest, published in the anthology "Flying Lessons and Other Stories." The main character in her story became the center of her first full-length middle grade novel, "Isaiah Dunn is My Hero."

She has since published a picture book and two more novels, the newest of which, "Isaiah Dunn Saves the Day," is set for release this month. Kelly held the student's attention as she shared stories about the writing life, engaged with questions, and read a section of "Isaiah Dunn is My Hero" at the campfire. Students were excited to receive a signed copy of her book. The READ Grant plans to bring her back this month for an author event at several 4- 6th grade schools over several days.
