

The Lansing Learning Hub allows students who want to pursue an alternative education a unique mix of online courses and in-person tutoring, labs, and resources. The program gives students voice and agency in their education, and shows them how their passions and life goals intersect with their education.

Introducing TEAMS!

Tactics to Expand Access to Mental health Supports is a school-based mental health services grant that will increase the district's capacity to support the mental health of high need students.

Teams Layers of Service

- **1. School-Based Team:** Hiring six mental health clinicians.
- 2. Fellowship: Providing 16 highlyqualified candidates a rigorous two-year experience including a Masters of Social Work.
- **3. Residency:** Collaborating with Michigan State University's School of Social Work to offer internships to graduate students.
- **4. Professional Development:**Providing extensive professional learning that includes counseling strategies, crisis intervention, trauma-informed care, and more.



Athletics: Eastern High School received brand new athletics facilities.

Building Improvements: Averill, Dwight Rich, North, Riddle, Sexton, and Wexford received renovations and upgrades. Renovations, upgrades, and additions were made to Post Oak and Everett Fairview was converted to the new Pattengill, and old Pattengill was converted to the new Eastern.

Furniture: Every school and classroom received new desks, chairs, furniture, and CleverTouch boards.

Professional Services: Contracted work with bond owner representative, architects, and engineers.

Safety/Security: All schools received surveillance cameras, and many entryways were redesigned with security in mind.

Site Improvements: Roofs, windows, HVAC, lighting and general remodeling was done to improve district efficiencies

Technology: District buildings received new phones, wireless systems, and surveillance cameras.
