In the event that parents cannot attend our School Improvement Team meetings, our Parent-Student Advocate will attend them and then share all information at PTO meetings and other parent community events. In order to solicit feedback from a greater number of parents we survey them throughout the year. An analysis of their responses will add value to our conversation about the direction in which Sexton should head.
